## Re: Annual Department of Consumer Affairs Distributed Costs Report

Dear Senator Roth and Assembly Member Berman:

Business and Professions Code section 201 requires the Department of Consumer Affairs (Department) to submit a report to the Legislature by July 1 of each year on the accounting of its pro rata calculation of administrative expenses.

The Department's report includes the following attachments:

- An overview of the methodology used for allocating distributed costs.
- A summary of costs by each service area of the Department for each board and bureau for the upcoming 2023-24 fiscal year.

The Department charges pro rata to recover its costs for centralized administrative services provided to the boards and bureaus. The Department's 36 boards and bureaus are supported by a staff of legal, technical, and administrative professionals at the Department. These professionals provide legal, human resources, information technology, communications, investigations, professional examinations, training, strategic planning, fiscal management, and other integral support services. All the work the Department performs is to support the boards and bureaus. Most distributed costs are based on workload and approximately one-third is distributed based on the authorized positions of the board or bureau. All savings achieved by the Department are returned to respective board and bureau funds at year-end.

In the attached spreadsheet of costs, there are five boards and one bureau that have higher than average costs at 30 percent or more of their annual budget. The following provides a brief explanation of the anomalies driving the costs.

 Medical Board of California: The Department has an entire unit (Health Quality Investigation Unit) of sworn investigators and support staff dedicated to providing this board with enforcement services that account for over 80 percent of the costs this board pays the Department.

- Physical Therapy Board, Board of Psychology, Board of Registered Nursing: These boards have a large workload with the Department's Division of Investigation and the costs of conducting investigations account for over half of the costs these boards pay the Department.
- <u>Board of Naturopathic Medicine</u>: This board has a significant enforcement case that resulted in an increase to the board's costs to support the Department's Division of Investigation.
- <u>Bureau of Security and Investigative Services</u>: This bureau has a large licensee population (over 400,000) that contributes to larger shares of BreEZe and Consumer Information Center costs.

## DEPARTMENT OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS DISTRIBUTED COST METHODOLOGY FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-24

This document provides a general overview of the various allocation methodologies the Department uses to distribute centralized expenses to its Boards and Bureaus along with descriptions and examples of the calculations used for each methodology.

## CONSUMER AND CLIENT SERVICES DIVISION (CCSD)

### 1. ADMINISTRATIVE & INFORMATION SERVICES DIVISION (AISD):

- AISD LESS OFFICE OF INFORMATION SERVICES (consists of the Executive Office, Equal Employment Opportunity Office, Internal Audits, Legal Affairs, Legislative Affairs, SOLID Training & Planning Solutions, Information Security, Organizational Improvement Office and the Office of Administrative Services [which consists of Fiscal Operations, Business Services Office, and Office of Human Resources]): Costs distributed to all boards/bureaus/programs based on authorized position count.
- OFFICE OF INFORMATION SERVICES (OIS): Costs distributed based on service center usage. Cost centers include Applicant Tracking System (ATS) and Consumer Affairs System (CAS), BreEZe, CONNECT, telecom, PC support, local area network and wide area network (LAN/WAN), and web services among others.
- OFFICE OF PROFESSIONAL EXAMINATION SERVICES (OPES): Most Services are direct costs based on individual intra-agency agreements with boards/bureaus/programs. Approximately 25 percent of OPES budget is distributed based on authorized position count to boards/bureaus/programs required to report pursuant to <u>Business and</u> <u>Professions Code section 139</u>.

## 2. COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION:

- PUBLIC AFFAIRS: Costs distributed based on authorized position count.
- PUBLICATIONS, DESIGN AND EDITING: Costs distributed based on authorized position count.
- DIGITAL PRINT SERVICES: Staffing costs distributed based on authorized position count. Costs of printing and materials are direct costs based on individual service request.
- CONSUMER INFORMATION CENTER (CIC): Costs distributed based on client's past year workload. Non-jurisdictional correspondence and call costs are distributed to all boards/bureaus/programs based on authorized position count.

#### **DIVISION OF INVESTIGATION (DOI)**

- SPECIAL OPERATIONS UNIT: Costs distributed based on authorized position count.
- HEALTH QUALITY INVESTIGATION UNIT (HQIU): Costs distributed fully to the Medical Board
  of California. Costs incurred by Allied Health Programs are based on an hourly rate and
  invoiced directly with reimbursement going to the Medical Board.
- INVESTIGATION & ENFORCEMENT UNIT: Costs distributed based on a two-year roll-forward methodology. This methodology uses a client's actual workload/costs from the prior year to build the client's budget in budget year, estimated to cover the client's budget year workload. This amount is modified with any credit or debit resulting from the client's prior year actual costs compared to their budgeted costs.

# DEPARTMENT OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS DISTRIBUTED COST CALCULATIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-24

#### **AUTHORIZED POSITION COUNT**

Used to distribute the budget for the Department's administrative units where costs benefit more than one Board or Bureau, and a specific workload metric is not available. (Examples: Fiscal Operations, Human Resources, etc.)

### **PAST YEAR WORKLOAD**

Used to distribute the budget for the Department's units where costs benefit more than one Board or Bureau, and workload is primarily based on a specific workload metric. (Example: Consumer Information Center)

#### **SERVICE CENTER USAGE**

Used to distribute the budget for the Department's units where costs benefit more than one Board or Bureau, and costs are based on specific device or record count. (Example: Office of Information Services)

#### **DIRECT COST**

Used to distribute the budget for the Department's units where costs benefit only one Board or Bureau. (Example: Health Quality Investigation Unit)

### **TWO-YEAR ROLL-FORWARD**

Used to distribute the budget for the Department's units where costs benefit more than one Board or Bureau, and workload is primarily based on a specific workload metric. Uses the ratio of past year workload to create a budget year estimate and modifies that amount with a true-up based on actual costs compared to the budget year estimate from two years ago. (Example: Investigation and Enforcement Unit)
